Musical Moments: Pipe Cleaner Shapes Wincey Terry-Bryant, Wolf Trap Master Teaching Artist

In this arts experience, **Wolf Trap Master Teaching Artist Wincey Terry-Bryant** sings a playful **shape song** and invites children to use **pipe cleaners** to **create each shape**. This arts-integrated activity combines **music** and **hands-on creativity** to support **early math skills** like **shape recognition**, **spatial awareness**, and **fine motor development**.

This experience is designed to provide educators with an opportunity to:

- Integrate music and hands-on play to support early math skills like shape recognition and spatial reasoning.
- Foster critical thinking and expand vocabulary by asking children to explain their reasoning and observations.
- Promote engagement and focus with singing, repetition, and visual cues.
- Help students develop critical skills such as fine motor and hand-eye coordination.

Target Age: Pre-K, ages 3 to 5

Key Vocabulary: create, shape, triangle, square, circle, rectangle, size, sides, vertices/points, same/different

*Connections to Early Childhood Learning Goals

- Language and Communication: Child attends to and builds vocabulary. Child understands, follows, and uses descriptive words to talk about shapes and their attributes.
- Cognitive Development: Child uses pipe cleaners creatively to form and interpret shapes.
- **STEM/Mathematics: Geometry and Spatial Sense:** Child identifies, describes, and composes shapes.
- **STEM/Compare and Categorize:** Child compares, contrasts, and categorizes shapes based on attributes such as number of sides and vertices.
- **Motor Development:** Child develops control, strength, and coordination of small muscles and fine motor skills.

Arts Concepts Highlighted in this Experience

Music:

- Teacher adapts and uses a familiar song to introduce and incorporate key shape vocabulary.
- Child responds to a simple song that incorporates key shape vocabulary and responds with appropriate actions.

Extending the Experience

- Bolster vocabulary by engaging children with questions: How many sides/vertices does our shape have? How do we know this is a triangle? How is a triangle different from a square? What is the same about a rectangle and a square?
- Continue to develop vocabulary by introducing the terms *compare/contrast* in place of *same/different*.
- Enhance critical thinking skills by partnering or grouping children and asking them to connect their pipe cleaners to make larger shapes.
- Adapt/use familiar songs to teach other key vocabulary or during transitions and routines, such as cleaning up or focusing attention.
